

Property Marking Scheme Information for Property Owners

The machine works by stamping your Eircode into • the item to be marked, using a series of dots.



- The depth and size of the dots is adjusted to suit the material to be marked, eg plastic, wood, • carbon fibre. It's VERY IMPORTANT that the correct pattern is selected for the material—too strong a stamp could damage the item to be marked.
- The machine CANNOT be used to stamp items made of GLASS, as glass will shatter. Many smart phones are made of glass, so take care to examine these carefully before attempting to mark them.
- The process of marking is essentially one which causes damage—by punching depressions into your item. There is a risk that the damage may go beyond what you are expecting or intending. By proceeding, you are accepting this risk. There are various patterns pre-programmed into the Telesis machine. These set the pin head to punch to varying depths, depending on the hardness of the material to be marked. It is therefore very important to identify correctly the material your item is made from. For example, carbon fibre, wood, etc. It is important that you check that the correct pattern is selected for EACH item.
